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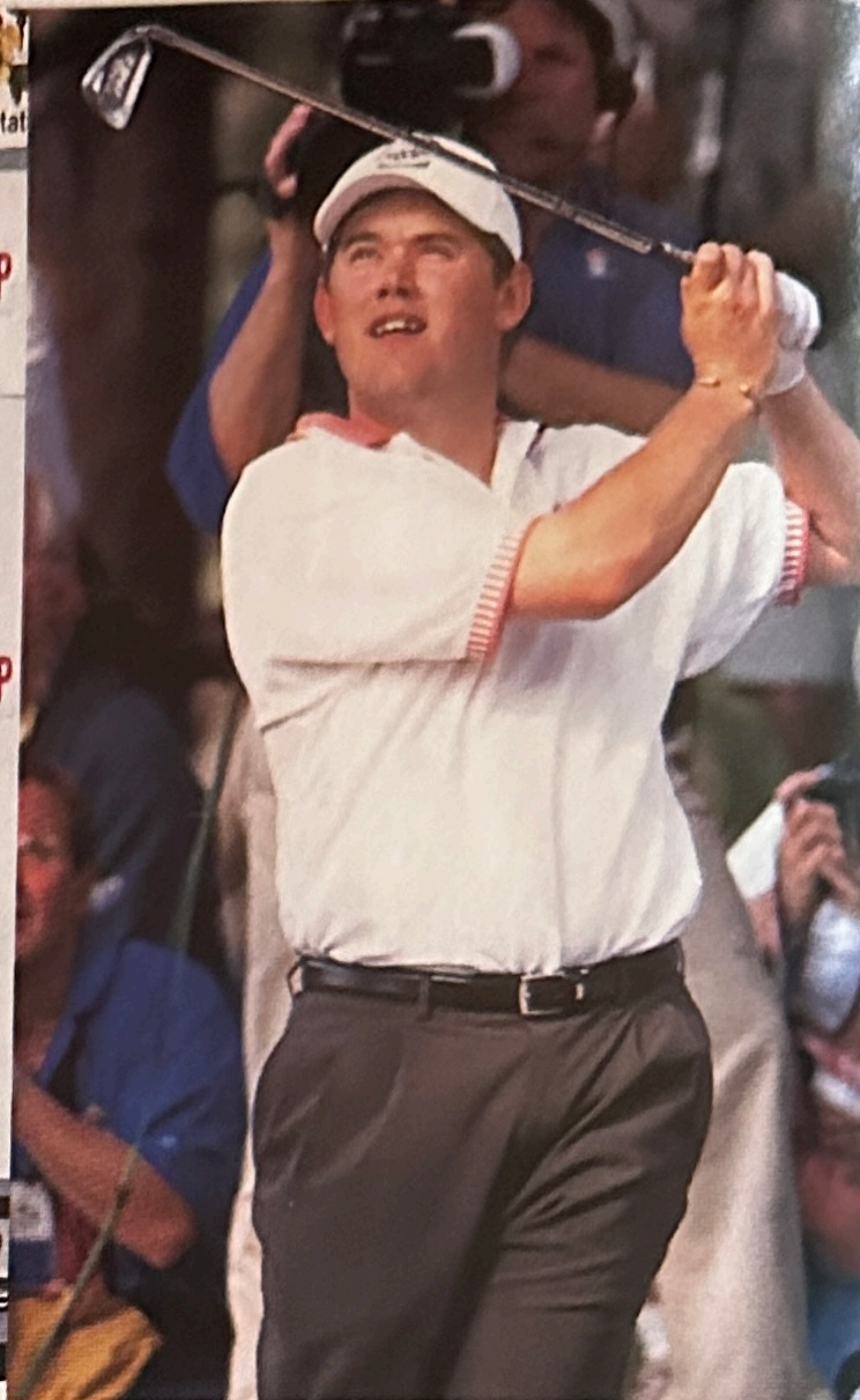

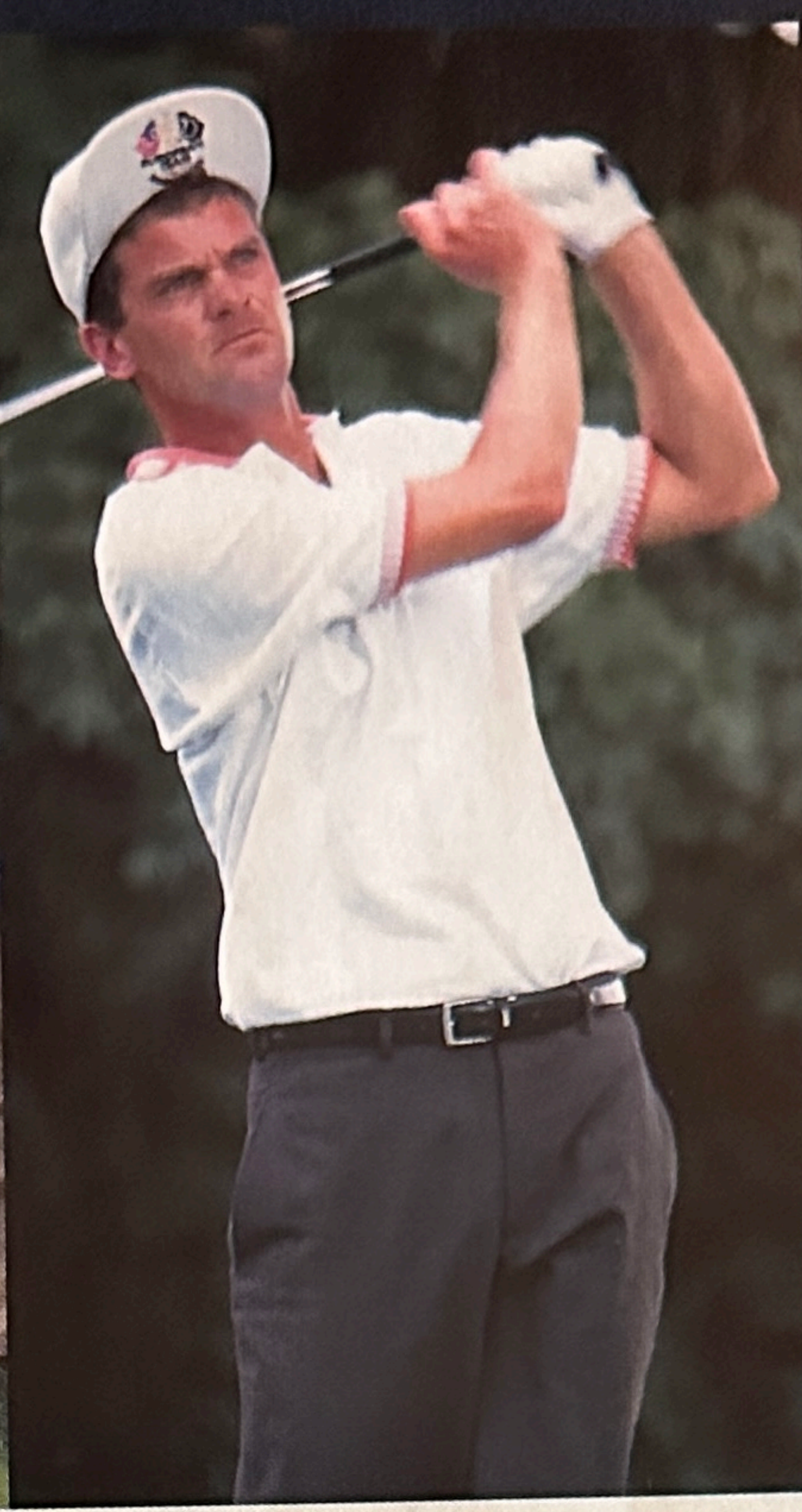

Day Two — 9/25/99

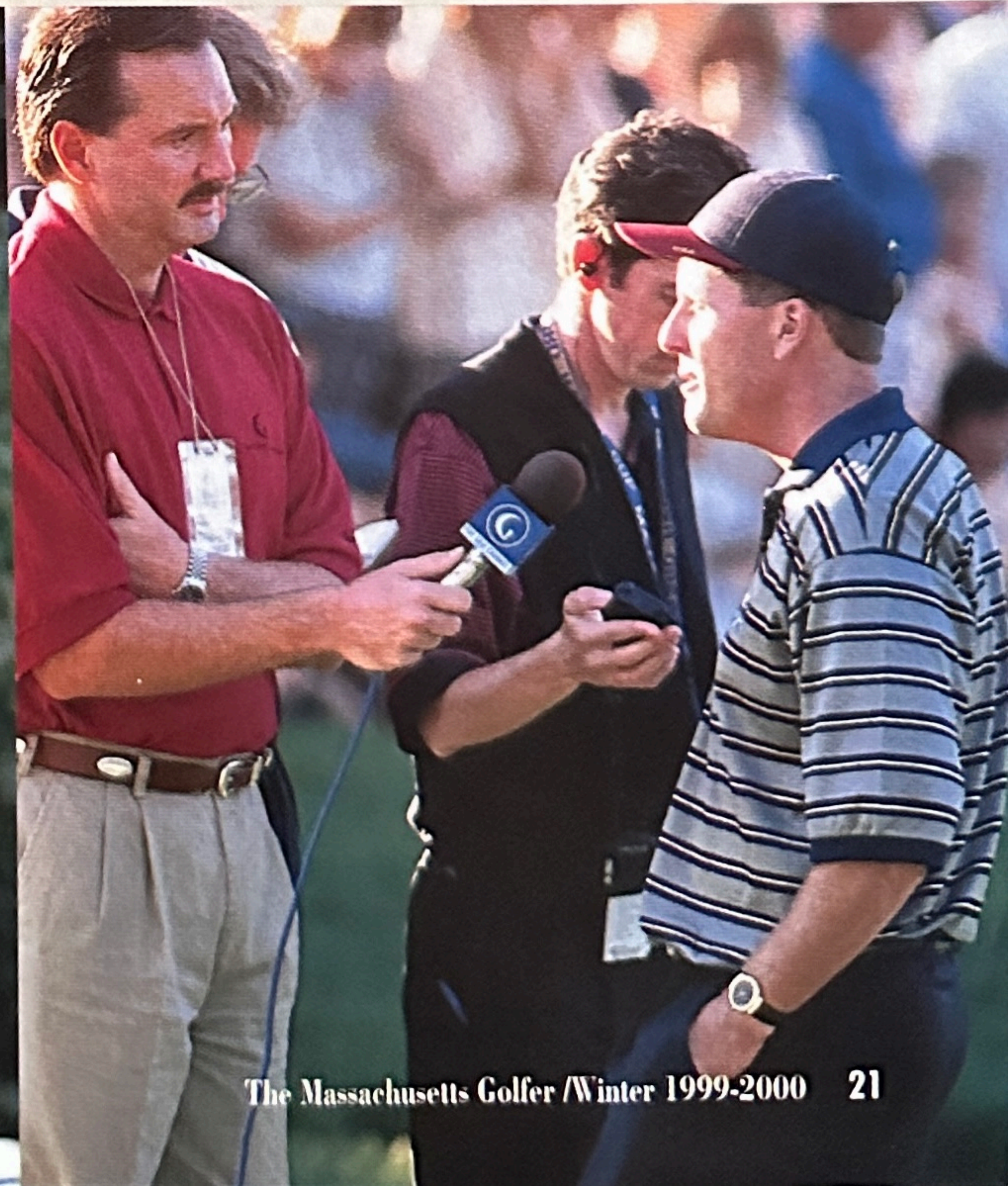
After building a Day One 6-2 lead, Europe maintained the commanding four point margin on Day Two, finishing with a 10-6 advantage. Only four more points would be needed for Europe to retain the Cup.

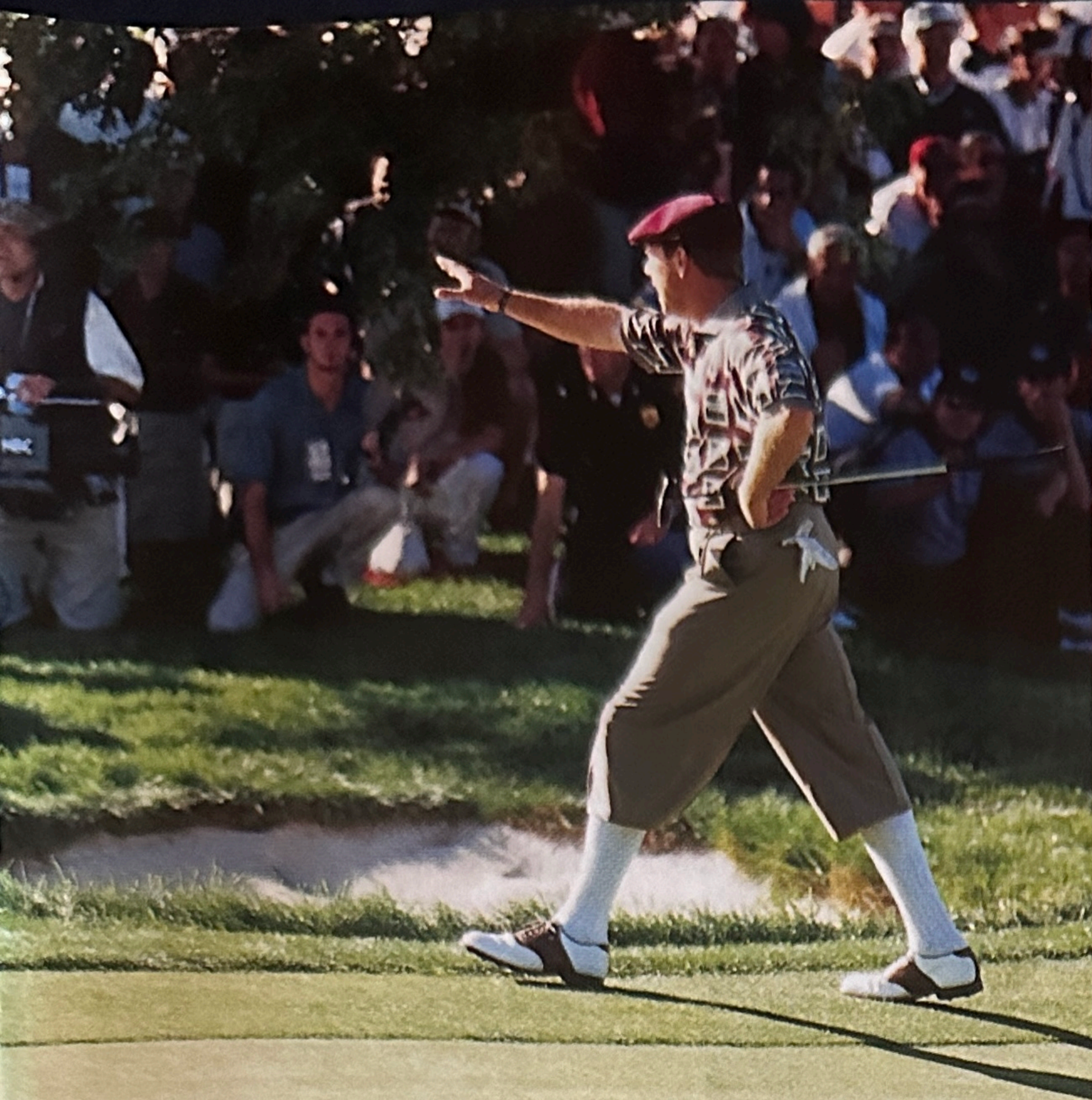

Day Three — 9/26/99

The task for the U.S. team was simple, yet formidable — rule in Day Three's singles. Bolstered by the previous evening's words of undaunting faith from Captain Ben Crenshaw, that's just what they did.
